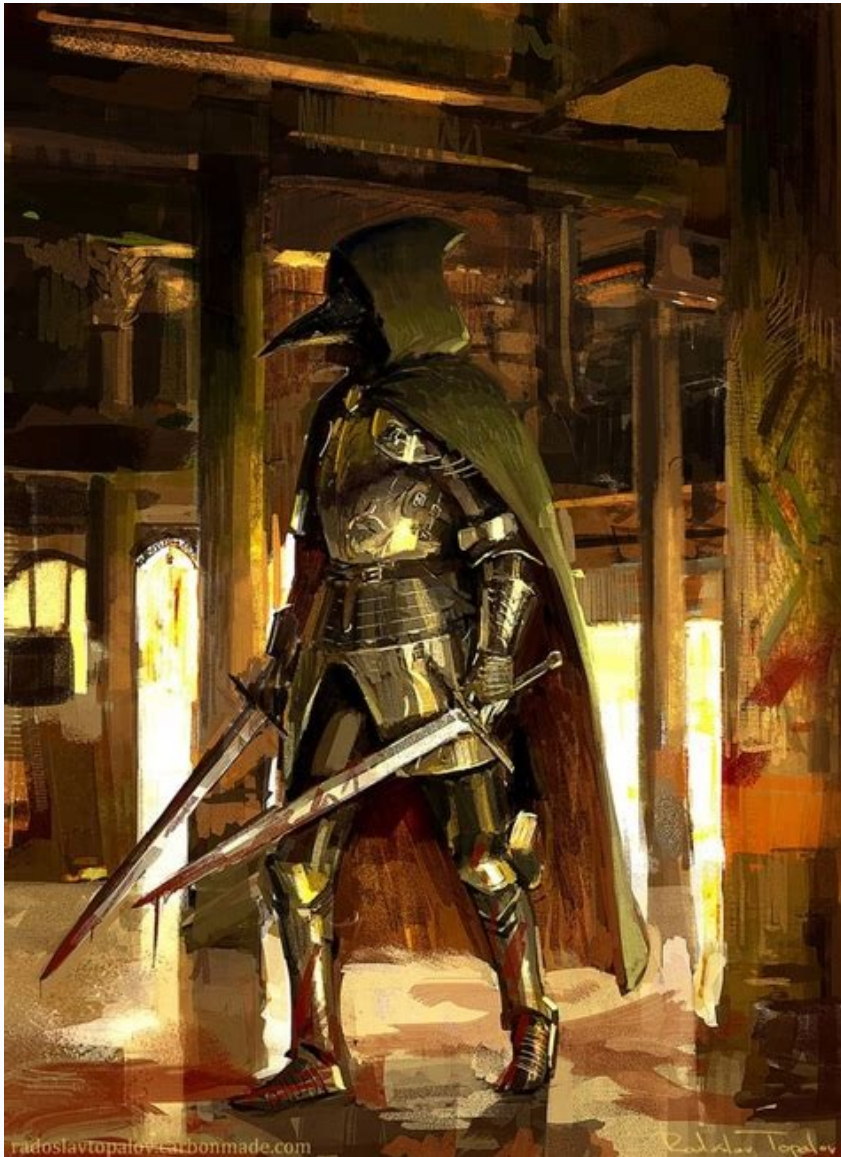
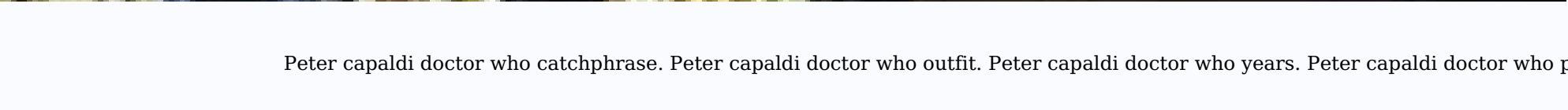


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Director who star Peter Capaldi has given us a glimpse of his upcoming, spine-chilling series for Prime Video, *The Devil's Hour* stars Capaldi as Gideon, a recluse's devil's hour – with terrifying visions. "The nature of the piece is quite spectacularly dark and that can be quite enjoyable," Capaldi said of the show (via RadioTimes). "I was one of the executive producers. 'Everything starts with the scripts and Tom's scripts were wonderful and inventive and such a brilliant idea at the core.' Capaldi continued: "The relationship to Raine's Lucy and her son, 'Jess plays a character who Gideon has absolutely targeted. He is coming for her, he is coming for her child, he will not stop until he has her.'"

The show stars Jessica Raine (Becoming Elizabeth) as Lucy, a detective plagued by nightmares who finds herself ensnared in serial killer Gideon's (Peter Capaldi) web. It's not clear if the time travel is actually happening, or if it's all just psychological, but it sure looks intense. The Devil's Hour also features Nikesh Patel who, in addition to starring in Hulu's Four Weddings and a Funeral, also appeared in a single Doctor Who episode with Jodie Whittaker's Doctor, not Capaldi's, though. And to tie a bow around the whole evil Doctor Who comparison, longtime Doctor Who showrunner Steven Moffat is executive producer of The Devil's Hour. He is portrayed by Scottish actor Peter Capaldi. As with previous incarnations of the Doctor, the character has also appeared in other Doctor Who spin-offs. Capaldi's portrayal of the Doctor has been met with critical acclaim by critics and fans alike, with his debut episode "Deep Breath" (2014) being particularly well-received. Capaldi's Doctor is characterized by a more serious, contemplative, and pragmatic character who conceals his emotions in the course of making tough and sometimes ruthless decisions. Over time, he becomes kinder, more compassionate, and more openly showcases his selflessness. This incarnation's companions include school teacher Clara Oswald (Jenna Coleman), canteen assistant and student Bill Potts (Pearl Mackie) and alien Nardole (Matt Lucas). He also made a guest appearance in the Doctor Who spin-off series Class, appearing in the show's first episode. Development Casting Peter Capaldi portrays the Twelfth Doctor. Matt Smith, who played the Eleventh Doctor, publicly announced his departure from Doctor Who on 1 June 2013,[1] triggering extensive media speculation on the subject of his successor.[2] On 3 August 2013, bookmakers William Hill suspended betting when Capaldi became the five to six favourite to be cast.[3] Capaldi's casting was revealed on 4 August during a live broadcast on BBC One, titled Doctor Who Live: The Next Doctor.[4] The live show, hosted by Zoe Ball, was watched by an average of 6.27 million in the UK, and was also simulcast in the United States, Canada and Australia.[5] While Capaldi was the first choice for the role, other actors were also approached in case Capaldi should turn the offer down. 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Doctor Who is a drastically different sort of man than the person we met way back in "Deep Breath"—and yet they are absolutely, believably the same character. In the end, Ruediger acknowledged it was marvelous to watch how this character learned and grew. It's not something that this series has ever really dared tackle before, but now that it's been done and accomplished so successfully, it will be difficult for the show to turn back. Peter Capaldi raised the bar for who and what the Doctor can be, and the series is all the better for it".[126] Alasdair Wilkins from Inverse stated that defining word for the 12th Doctor is "kind". "It's what moves him at the Christmas Amistice in Ypres, and it's part of his final advice to his next self. That the incarnation who began his existence so prickly and aloof would end it as the champion of kindness speaks to just how much this Doctor grew and developed over this three seasons". He said that it shows how brilliant Capaldi's performance has been. Wilkins noted how 12th Doctor gradually warmed up, realising showing his true self - reason for his older appearance - meant being "unashamedly, unreservedly kind".
